STORM WATER RUN-OFF

Storm water run-off is precipitation from rain or snowmelt that flows over the ground. As it flows, it can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants and deposit them into a storm sewer system or water -body.

Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the water-bodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water.

REMEMBER: ONLY RAIN DOWN THE

DRAIN

To keep the storm water leaving your home or workplace clean, follow these simple guidelines:

- Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly.
- Repair auto leaks.

- Dispose of household hazardous waste, used auto fluids (antifreeze, oil, etc.), and batteries at designated collection or recycling locations.
- Clean up after your pet.
- Use a commercial car wash or wash your car on a lawn or other unpaved surface.
- Sweep up yard debris rather than hosing down areas. Compost or recycle yard waste when possible.

TREE TRIMMING

Attention: All Property Owners who have trees growing over sidewalks and streets. City Code states that trees be trimmed to a height of twelve (12) feet above any roadway, or ten (10) feet above any curb, or edge of roadway.

We ask that you evaluate your trees and trim them accordingly. Also, please trim back behind the curb or roadway any other shrubbery, or plants that need it.

As we prepare for the winter months ahead, this helps in the process of snow removal from our streets by making it safer for our trucks and equipment to pass.

We ask that this be done "as soon as possible", but not later than October 31, 2013. At that time the City Staff will determine if there are trees that still need attention. If so, the City Public Works will trim the trees at the proper CITY CEMETERY
